

Leadership Institute 2018...

In the last week of September, we were privileged to attend a leadership conference for United Methodists hosted by the United Methodist Church of the Resurrection (COR) in Leawood, Kansas. This huge church is led by the Reverend Adam Hamilton, a well-known author, whose works we have studied and will study in our church. As Advent begins we will be having a 4-week study on his book, <u>The</u> Journey. The vision of COR is

to be used by God to change lives, strengthen churches, and transform the world.

One of the ways COR lives its vision is to host the Leadership Institute every year to help other churches, whether they be large and vibrant or small and struggling.

We attended several workshops, including Small Churches - Big Impact, Discipleship Pathways, Revitalizing a Struggling Church, Beyond the Five Practices, Creating a Culture of Radical Hospitality, Reaching and Engaging Millennials & Generation Z, and Using Data to Increase Giving and Measure Effectiveness. We also heard several speakers in the general sessions, including Adam Hamilton on Peter: Flawed but Faithful Disciple, Bishop Robert Schnase on Turning Our Practices Inside Out. There were other men and women who spoke on First Impressions, and Fostering Relationships Between Faith Groups.

The overwhelming message we both received was that if we do not change how we do church, we cannot expect to make disciples of Christ for the transformation of the world, which is the mission of the United Methodist Church. One speaker put it clearly – Keep the Main Thing, the Main Thing and everything else can be changed to meet a changing world. The main thing he was talking about is that Jesus is the Master; God so loved the world that He gave His Son; and the Great Commission in Matthew 28:19 – Go and make disciples of all nations. The changes he was talking about are our mindset, our methodology and our ministries.

Over and over again we heard that we cannot expect people to come to our churches unless we are visible in action in the community so that they can see and hear us. People need a way to connect with us besides coming on Sunday morning. They need to see how they can serve, how they can receive help or how their questions can be addressed. They need to know that they are welcome, regardless of their life situation or any past experiences they may have had with a church, and that God loves them now and forever.

We were told again and again to get out beyond our walls; to meet people where and how they are and offer them a way to connect. This may mean holding events and ministries in the community, hosting more groups in our facility; improving our online presence and many more things we just haven't thought of yet.

We were challenged and uplifted. We were encouraged to use our "Special Sauce" here at FUMC Hanford – our unique strengths and gifts, our unique characteristics, circumstances, location and people to close the gap between the world as it is and the way God wants it to be. We were encouraged to be outward focused, thought-provoking and the builders of bridges.


On a final note, one of the most impactful things we encountered at COR was their stated purpose:

to build a Christian community where non-religious and nominally religious people are becoming deeply committed Christians.

What would it look like here in Hanford if we saw ourselves as a bridge to discipleship? Can we figure out how to be a church where those who doubt can find answers, acceptance, inspiration and love? We have work to do, but we know that God has been faithful to us and wants us to carry His message to this corner of the Kingdom.

9 tips on writing a devotional

1. Do all your writing in one notebook. Much easier to find than loose papers Much handier to carry and "operate." Be sure it has lined pages.

2. Near the front of the notebook reserve a whole page for possible topics.

Just ideas to write about

You can go back later and see what's there You can go back later and add new ideas

3. Next pick a topic that grabs you.

Start writing words about it. Go as fast you legibly can. Doesn't have to be sentences.

Then go to the very next page and put your words together

4. Now that you have something written down, READ other authors.

Include some who are writing short devotionals, such as The Upper Room.

Notice how authors connect a personal story, scripture verse and an application.

Confer with a fellow writer about what you noticed they did in the piece you read.

Add some ideas in your notebook.

- 5. Find a comfortable place to write.
- 6. When you are ready to start a complete piece, just start writing.

Keep writing until you get all your ideas down.

The next day go back and read it.

Rewrite it to put your ideas or story in a better order.

Keep all this IN your note book.

7. Now pick a key thought in your piece, and try - on a new page - rewriting the whole thing with that key thought as your beginning.

Compare the pieces.

Does one grab the reader more?

Is one shorter, but easier to understand?

- 8. Do #7 again, starting with a different beginning, but using something you already wrote.
- 9. Pray. This is the best part

The second one is the one I hope you have already heard about. It will be after church on Sunday, December 9, 2018.

At *that* charge conference we will celebrate the past year and elect key people to help lead us in the year to come. Our District Superintendent Rev. Debra Brady will be here to lead us in that conference.

We are holding it at that day and time because your presence is needed as part of this body to validate what we are doing. We need your review and questions.

The first charge conference needs you, too. It has a much briefer agenda: one item.

I will try to explain it to you. It has to do with the tax reform law passed by Congress last year that took effect for our 2018 taxes. One part affected the taxability of an employer paying the moving expenses of an employee. That is now considered taxable pay. The employer (the church) has to report those moving expenses as having been paid to the employee (the pastor) as taxable income.

I must explain that Pastor Pablo is not an employee of the local church. The US tax code, however, labels pastors 'statutory employees' when they are appointed as the United Methodist Church does.

So our one agenda item is to amend our official pay agreement with Pastor Pablo and add the legally required part of his moving expenses.

That's it.

(And in case you are wondering, at the second charge conference, since we do not expect him to move again in 2019, we have to take that pay category right back out.)

We also need your vote to validate that compensation package. Please plan to *stay after church* for a few minutes on Sunday, November 11th for a short, but very official and legally necessary charge conference.

Angel Tree

This is another opportunity to serve our community. Angel Tree is a wonderful way to express Christ's love. It warms the heart to know that you helped members of our community; all our kids are from Kings County this year. All the angels are on the tree in Mary Lane Hall. Here is the background of the program:

Over the summer, Angel Tree applications are provided to the prison Chaplains. Restrictions do apply. The Chaplains pass these out to prisoners who have children. The Chaplains then send the completed applications to Angel Tree. The applications are scanned and entered into the computer. The applications are then assigned to churches, organizations etc. (Visit www.angeltree.org for more information.)

Our roles: Each child's name will be on the Christmas tree twice, one will be a toy and the other clothes, child's name, and age, type of gifts the child wants, and a personal note from the parent in prison. When you pick the angel you want, either I or a helper needs to write the child's name and code number also with your name and number. *All presents are due back by <u>December 15, 2018</u>. If you need an extension, please let David Beeman know.*

Gifts: Cost is between \$15.00-\$20.00 only; you can wrap, or one of the elves will wrap. If you wish, an elf can buy the gift for you—just give the donation you want spent, and the elf will do the rest.

- Wrap/buy gifts
- Need to go in groups of two to deliver gifts
- Set up and tear down Christmas decorations, etc.
- Volunteers to help at a party to distribute gifts December 16, 2018
